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God Loves Babies

Abortion is not a modern invention. It, and infanticide (the killing of a baby after birth), were very common in the ancient pagan societies. Life was seen by many as cheap and expendable. And then change came beginning in the 300's A.D. Society's beliefs about abortion and infanticide started changing. And the laws were changed, too. Both abortion and infanticide were outlawed. Sure, some still took place — not everyone obeys the law! But the numbers went down. Many, many more babies got a chance at life.

So who was responsible for this change, for outlawing abortion and infanticide about 1700 years ago? We were. By saying "We were", I obviously don't mean us literally — we weren't around! By "we", I mean our Orthodox Church. Our Church taught against all that killing, struggled against it, and once our Church brought the Roman Empire to Christ, the laws were changed. Thank God for our spiritual ancestors!

But now abortion is back bigger than ever before. And even infanticide is getting more accepted — witness the horrible sight of standing ovations in some state legislatures as they recently legalized it in some circumstances.

Yes, society has changed and laws have changed. But God's law and truth haven't changed. So our beliefs are still the same today as they were back 1700 years ago.

Because our beliefs are strong and clear, this leads to several obligations for Orthodox believers —

First — We should strongly uphold our beliefs and make sure all of our people are aware of them. And make sure the world knows what we believe. That includes doing all we can to change the laws, just as our Church successfully did 1700 years ago.

Second — We need to help women in tough pregnancy situations to choose life instead of death. We need to give them moral support, friendship, financial help.

Third — We need to help the children after birth as well ... food, clothing, money. Whatever is needed. And we should strive to have adoption seen as a good option.

Fourth — We need to help and support women who have had abortions, stressing to them that there is forgiveness from God. As St. Cyril of Jerusalem wrote — "Add up your sins and they are smaller than God's mercy." God forgives ... and so we must also forgive. And we as parishes, and through ZOE for Life!, must do all we can to help women who have had abortions realize they can find forgiveness from God and peace and joy in that forgiveness.

Sometimes it seems the world is getting darker and darker. So we, followers of the light of the world, Jesus Christ, must shine more brightly. Like a candle in a dark room, drawing people to the light of God.

God used our

Binghamton Chapter



An enthusiastic group of Orthodox clergy and lay people met on Tuesday, June 4, 2019, to discuss founding a ZOE for Life! branch in the Binghamton, NY, area. The attendees, including Fr. Ilya Gotlinsky, Marilyn Brady, Alexandra Zona, Fr. Jim Dutko, Fr. Jason Kappanadze, Matushka Marge Kappanadze, and Paul Komatinsky,

met at Dormition of the Virgin Mary Church, and enjoyed a potluck meal while they discussed the feasibility of a ZOE for Life! chapter.

The group decided to move ahead with forming a branch that they will call ZOE for Life! Southern Tier (Upstate New York's counties that extend from east to west along the Pennsylvania border). They concluded that there is a crucial need for teaching about life issues among Orthodox and non-Orthodox people, and hope to find opportunities to educate people of all ages. First steps will include scheduling presentations at area parishes to raise awareness and expand their membership, and creating a list of area organizations, resources, and professionals that could serve people faced with crisis pregnancies.

To explore the establishment of such a ministry in the Greater Pittsburgh area, a group of Orthodox clergy and laity visited the ZOE House in Parma, Ohio. The purpose of the visit was to gain a more complete understanding of the ministry that the staff of ZOE House have been engaged in for over 20 years. The exploratory committee was graced with a very informative and inspiring visit, and our hosts offered much appreciated insight into the various ministries offered by ZOE for Life!. We were given a tour of the various areas of the facility which gave us a "first hand" perspective of what is needed to facilitate the work of ZOE.

During our visit, the staff and volunteers of ZOE for Life! were invited to make a presentation of their vision and work at an informational meeting hosted by St. George Antiochian Orthodox Church, Bridgeville, PA. This meeting took place on Saturday, May 11, 2019. During



the presentation, they shared their personal witness to the outstanding work of ZOE for Life! and offered their insights into the holy ministry of Our Lord in protecting the life of mother and child. Following the presentations and lunch, participants gathered in groups to discuss the various aspects of this ministry and shared ideas for the establishment of a ministry in the Pittsburgh area. Thankfully a group of clergy and laity have offered their time and God-given talents to make this ministry a reality. Our initial goal is to bring an awareness of the need of this type of ministry to the churches in the Greater Pittsburgh area and to begin an informational campaign in and through a variety of venues.

During 2018, a steering committee—comprised of members of St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and St. Vladimir Russian Orthodox Church—have been meeting at St. Nicholas in Ann Arbor to work towards creating a board, creating by-laws, and discussing the collaboration with St. Vladimir's next door in Dexter, Michigan. The board is currently working to set up our chapter so that we can begin our outreach work in 2019. It has been a long journey, and we still have a long way to go! Both churches are excited to work with each other for the same philanthropic goal, and hopefully we can roll out our presence to all the area churches in Southeastern Michigan soon.

What started off as a small aspiration from our Parish Priests has turned into an official existing chapter! St. Vladimir Russian Orthodox Church had been working with the Livonia ZOE for Life! Chapter before it dissolved. The Livonia Chapter had decided to fold, and offered valuable information to help start our own ZOE for Life! Chapter. Father Nick Kotsis at St. Nicholas Kotsis and Father Gregory Joyce at St. Vladimir together discussed a future collaboration for a ZOE for Life! chapter. From there a group of women from both St. Nicholas and St. Vladimir churches met as a steering committee, put together an informational retreat, and eventually formed the board. St. Vladimir has the ability to offer storage space for storing baby clothing and layette items that were donated from the Livonia Chapter. St. Nicholas has the ability to offer meeting space. Together our churches have formed an organization, as well as a new bond between Orthodox churches, and new friendships!

Our chapter is currently working towards functional operations in 2019, being realistic in the services we can offer with our resources. We have been blessed to acquire social workers, medical professionals, business professionals, and women of action and passion. We plan to launch an informative website and a ZOE for Life! hotline number and text service in 2019. We will work towards outlining services that we can provide, or be a conduit to area services that can be useful to a mother in need. We will be looking for patrons to join our efforts and will share more information at our first annual patron meeting in the first quarter of 2019. Patrons are not exclusive to our two parishes. While our first goal is to work on our internal structure, in order for ZOE for Life! Southeastern Michigan to be a sustainable

organization, we will need to grow in numbers and spread out our arms to hold hands, from church to church, encompassing all of our southeastern Orthodox brothers and sisters in Christ.

We have learned to ask, listen, and research all that we can. We have been blessed to receive both solicited and unsolicited advice from our mentors. Let Light Shine in the Darkness

When we are in love with someone, do we think of them only once a week, or on special occasions, or are they always on our mind, never far from our thoughts? Do we spend time wondering what we can do for them, how we can please them or do something to make them happy?

How do we react when we see them? Do we rush to greet them with a joy that fills our heart, with an eager embrace, perhaps a kiss?

Do we truly love the Lord? How do we act when we see Christ in an icon? Are we happy, do we rejoice to greet Him? How often do we think of Him in a day? In a week? His Love?

He bestowed the Holy Spirit upon each of us at our baptism, as He taught: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." Matthew 28:19 From that instant onward, for the rest of our lives, we bear that part of God in our hearts and in our minds. He asks for a return of His Love - that portion of His Holy Spirit that He granted us at our baptism, he longs have returned to Him! God created this intimacy with us, gave us this piece of Him, so that our yearning to be close to Him, may in some small way reflect His longing to be close to us. That's right, reader, He longs to be close to you!

How can we strengthen our relationship with God? How can we become more intimate with Him?

Jesus chastised the Pharisees for their 'long prayers' for



Our prayers are the power He has granted us to be heard by Him. They are the most powerful thing we can do for ourselves, for those we love, and for the world around us. When tragedy strikes, we ask, "What can we do?" Our prayers to our Father are an irresistible call to the very throne of God for His Mercy, when we pray with our whole selves.

Don't be deceived into thinking that He is ever 'too busy' to be there for us, or that our problems are 'too insignificant' to bother Him with. Never think that He has too many other important things to do than to listen to us, to comfort and guide us. That reduces His Divine capacity to the limit of human thought.

Our prayers reach Him when we open our hearts to Him; when we share our pains and sufferings with Him; when we offer our secret hopes and dreams to Him. They reach Him when we pray from our hearts, with our entire selves. He hears us when we pray as if we were trying to prevent the crucifixion of His Christ!

The days we are living in are grave indeed. Isaiah foretold these times in 5:20, and Timothy warns of these days in his second epistle; 3:1-4. Our prayers are our best defense against the evils and darkness that surround us. Through our intimate and insistent prayers to Him, we can cut through the darkness that enshrouds the world, and usher in a return of His Light!
